The OLMD is in the process of obtaining a permit for the 2024 season from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to apply herbicides for the control of aquatic plants in Okauchee Lake. GOOSE ROUND-UP

This year the OLMD will again cooperate with the USDA Fish and Wildlife Service to round up non-migratory Canadian Geese on Okauchee Lake. The Goose Round-Up will take place in mid-June when the birds are flightless. In order for this project to move forward, we need your consent.

We are required to have your consent to access your property before the Round-Up. Once you provide consent, you are no longer required to complete it annually.



WEED MANAGEMENT 2024

A friendly reminder to make sure weed piles are both visible and accessible for the barges to collect. Placement at the end of the pier/dock is typically preferable, shoreline pile is acceptable if pier collection is not feasible and if barge accessible. If a container is used to hold weeds for pick up, please use one with holes to drain water from weeds.

Barging operations (weed pick up from pier) are due to begin just before Memorial Day weekend and will run Monday-Friday (with exception of holidays) until Mid September.

If you hire outside companies/individuals to collect your weeds, please remind these groups that our barge and crews will not pick up trash, rocks, large mud clots, tree limbs and fallen leaves.





Getting Back Out on the Water as a Good Neighbor

It is that time of the year when we deploy our things into the water to get ready for a wonderful boating season on the lake. As good neighbors it is important to know what the rules and regulations are that govern Okauchee Lake waters and shorelines.

Boating regulations are important for the safety of everyone using the lake and serve as a guide for the safe, courteous, and legal use of your watercraft. Be sure to review the most current regulations that can be found on the DNR website.

Piers and Boat Slips are another important part of lake life and are also regulated by the DNR. Wisconsin pier laws do regulate the size of the structure (e.g., width) and how you use the structure (e.g., boat slips/berths). Between placement and size, It can be a bit complex, so a great resource to use is the WI DNR Pier Planner.

The number of boat slips, berths, mooring spaces, etc. allowed on your property is determined by the amount of shoreline owned. Wisconsin law states that for non-commercial properties or properties with less than three dwelling units, up to two boat slips are allowed for the first 50 feet of shoreline owned and one for each additional full 50 feet of shoreline owned. For non-commercial properties you can also place two personal watercraft for the first 50 feet of shoreline owned and one personal watercraft for each additional 50 feet of shoreline owned. While not as common as they once were, many properties have mooring buoys. Mooring buoys must be placed within 150 ft of shore and in a way that doesn't affect public or other riparian owners' rights. The lake also has several municipal and OLMD managed regulatory buoys on the lake. All marker and regulatory buoys (i.e. swim areas) must be approved by the local DNR Conservation Warden and by the local unit of government before placement.
